Theft Of Your Christmas Presents

Favourite items for thieves are gadgets like mobile phones, laptops, MP3 players and satellite navigation systems.

I'm sure many of you were lucky enough to get one of these items for Christmas.

They are most vulnerable when on view in your car so don't leave luggage or valuables on display. Even an old coat or cigarette packet can be a temptation for someone to smash and grab. Car thieves steal first and think about value later. Take valuables with you or lock them in the boot out of sight. Don't be tempted to hide things under the seats or leave them in the glove box.

Thieves are innovative and latest scams include:

- Using a mobile phone with Bluetooth capability to scan your vehicle or home for any items you may have with Bluetooth enabled, then breaking in and helping themselves. So even though you have gone to the trouble to lock your valuables in the boot, they can be detected. DISABLE YOUR BLUETOOTH BEFORE YOU LEAVE.
- Satellite Navigation systems are highly sought after and criminals look for the sucker mark that is left on the inside of the windscreen when it is removed, then break in on the off chance that you've hidden the unit in the car. CLEAN THE TELL TALE MARK AND TAKE YOUR SAT NAV WITH YOU.

And finally...

December saw a fall in reported crime in the Dean area, despite 5 reported housebreakings, although 3 have been solved and a 22-year-old male was arrested and charged with those offences and is also a suspect for several similar crimes reported over the past few months and enquiries are continuing. As in the Dean area, crime in the Craigleith areas in December was lower than that of the previous month. There were reports of vehicle's racing activity, despite the weather - within the surrounding roads of Craigleith Retail Park. The area has extensive CCTV coverage and we are liasing with staff to curtail this. There was a break-in to the garage at Queensferry Road Edinburgh and items were stolen and an office was broken into in the Western General Hospital, a dwelling house at Queensferry Road Edinburgh had the front door forced and splintered under pressure where cash, medication and various other items were stolen. There was incidents of youths throwing snowballs at passing cars near to Crewe Road North and also youths on bicycles in Telford Road cycling in front of cars but on police arrival there has been no trace.


Stockbridge

Happy New Year! Good arrest – A 22-year-old male was arrested on the 31st of December, and charged with break-in's and attempted break in's to homes in Comely Bank, Comely Bank Road, Orchard Road, and also a break in to a car which was parked in Saxe Coburg Place. This same male had been arrested two days previously for breaching his court bail and being found in possession of heroin. He was remanded in custody until 20 January 2010. Oxfam Music, Raeburn Place, suffered the loss of a large amount of valuable records, which they suspected was the result of price ticket changing. After a media release, the male who "bought" these records was traced, and has returned the large majority of these records, also offering further donations.
